### Light of Joy 1 Peter 1.8

Though you have not seen him, you love him. Though you do not now see him, you believe in him and rejoice with joy that is inexpressible and filled with glory.

...rejoice with jOy...

"*chara*" (used 58 times in the NT):

joy, rejoicing, happiness, gladness

Hebrew: asher

Greek: makarios

Closest English translation: happy

<u>Light of Joy</u> Blessed (Psalm 1) While most believers <u>don't know</u> what blessed means, Most unbelievers <u>don't care</u> what it means.



A pastor writes that many people thought him to be unhappy:

"Cheer up," people would say. "Why are you so serious all the time?"



<u>Light of Joy</u> My many and varied explanations over the years may have faltered, but could have been summed up in one word: *makarios*. To these myopic observers I may not have appeared happy,



because I had long since moved past "happy" to the more substantial state of Spiritual "joy". There is a deep, profound Spiritual joy that is far superior to any amount of superficial happiness.

<u>Light of Joy</u> Alcorn's comments: Certainly we should seek a deep joy, but is happiness something we are to "move past" to reach an unemotional "joy" that others actually mistake for unhappiness?



Attempts to make *makarios* lofty and super-spiritual can rob happiness in God of its rich, emotional warmth and delight. When Jesus used the word, it meant <u>deep</u> happiness, not <u>deeply hidden</u> happiness.



## <u>Light of Joy</u> Outward expressions: <u>Prov 15.13</u> - A glad heart makes a cheerful face <u>Job 8.21</u> - He will yet fill your mouth with laughter <u>Ps 16.11</u> - In Your presence there is fullness of joy John 15:11 - These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full.

<u>Light of Joy</u> Outward expressions: Genuine Smiles Laughter Encouraging Words Sparkling Eyes Play - happiness in motion



## Are you happy? Are you able to <u>express</u> your happiness? Do others notice?





Growing up, I knew I was "loved" (and for that I am extremely thankful) but I didn't always sense that I was "liked".

What if "liking" someone is actually a deeper, richer, more authentic form of loving them?

<u>Light of Joy</u>

We are <u>supposed</u> to love family members but it's sometimes much more difficult to like them – to like being around them. <u>Be honest</u>.

I want my children to know that I not only love them, but that <u>I really like them</u> that I like being around them and like spending time learning all about them. And...I want them to like each other!

And so it is with happiness and joy.

What if happiness is actually a deeper, richer, more authentic form of joy?

We know Jesus was joyful...(Ps 16.11) It's vital to also know that He was extremely happy!

### <u>Light of Joy</u> Conclusion: Let's reclaim <u>Biblical happiness</u>! And not let it be defined as a "merely superficial term" that should be avoided at all costs in order to make room for a "deeper, more profound joy".

#### 2. Selfishness

<u>Definition</u>: A stable tendency to devote one's time and resources to one's own interests and welfare – and unwillingness to inconvenience one's self for others.

<u>Research paper "The Altruism Paradox"</u>: are <u>far less likely to be happy</u> than those whose efforts are devoted to <u>making others happy</u>.

Research paper "The Altruism Paradox": Remarkable Conclusion: Do unto others as you would have them do unto you. (*Luke 6.31*)

#### Isaiah 58.10

*if you pour yourself out for the hungry and satisfy the desire of the afflicted, then shall your <u>light rise in the darkness</u> and your gloom be as the noonday.*

#### <u>1 Corinthians 4.3</u>

But with me it is a very small thing that I should be judged by you or by any human court. In fact, I do not even judge myself.

## Selfishness Stoic view of God



<u>Light of Joy</u> Nearly all Christians believe that God is good, but many don't believe that he's good natured. When we think of God as happy, we see how happiness overflows in all he does.



<u>Light of Joy</u> If your grumpy neighbor asks, "what are you up to?" you'll see it as a suspicious, condemning question. But if your cheerful neighbor asks the same thing, you'll smile and talk about your plans.



<u>Light of Joy</u>

We interpret people's words according to how we perceive their character and outlook.

So it is with our view of God.



<u>Light of Joy</u> We [should] realize that the happiness we feel in gratitude for what he's done for us makes God happy too. I believe it's vital that we not leave our children and future generations of Christians...



<u>Light of Joy</u> to figure out for themselves that God is happy. Most never will. How can they, unless their families and churches teach them and demonstrate God-centered happiness in their own lives?



<u>Light of Joy</u> We need to tell them that sin, suffering, shame, and unhappiness are temporary conditions for God's people.

# <u>Light of Joy</u> Charles Spurgeon

I hear my Father's voice in the thunder and listen to the whispers of His love in the cadence of the sunlit waves. These are my Father's works and, therefore, I admire them and I seem all the nearer to Him when I am among them.

So what do I do when I am <u>unhappy</u> in my life because there seem to be <u>too few</u> favorable and <u>far too many</u> unfavorable circumstances?

# Light of Joy 1 Thessalonians 5.16-18

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

Rejoice (but I really don't want to...)

Pray (but what should I pray?)

Thank God for who He is and what He is doing

Spend enough time in <u>thankfulness</u> and you will find yourself <u>rejoicing</u>!

Should we be happy due to <u>favorable</u> circumstances?

Can we be happy during <u>unfavorable</u> circumstances?

The answer to both is...YES.

But only because we follow a joyful Savior!

# Hebrews 12.2

looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy(*chara*) that was set before him endured the cross...



<u>Light of Joy</u> To become happy, we must do what happy people do. Both modern research and Scripture put the ball in our court. Happy people <u>give</u> generously, serve others, and seek to make others happy.



Happiness doesn't precede giving and serving; it *accompanies* and *follows* it.

<u>Light of Joy</u>

Want to be happy? Look for opportunities to <u>help others find happiness</u>. You can do this in thousands of ways! (Do some Olympians think this way?)

<u>Allyson Felix</u>: 11 Olympic medals. Most of any track and field athlete.

<u>Light of Joy</u>

Imagine the joy when we start to do <u>all</u> we do simply for the happiness of God and others.
