The thorns of <u>Psalm 107</u> are where we all find our hearts and marriages at times: <u>dryness</u>, <u>darkness</u>, <u>foolishness</u>, <u>turbulence</u>

How can these circumstances be helpful?

Thorns in marriage are unpleasant and <u>unavoidable</u>.

But thorns in marriage are also <u>opportunities</u>.

(growth, humility, understanding, chemo)



Our problem is not the thorn.

Our problem is listening to <u>Satan's message</u> rather than <u>God's message</u> about the thorn.

The thorn is a messenger from Satan.

The thing that discourages you is not the thorn, but the message with it.

My discouragement or my strengthening will depend on which message I listen to.

With every thorn, there is a message from God.

The Thorns in Marriage Thorn: Psalm 107...The Foolishness of Sinful Choices Satan's message: You are going to die. All is lost. Hope is gone. <u>You have left God</u>. Our reaction: Cry out for deliverance. 3 or maybe 300 times. God seems absent. God's reaction: Remind us of His Sacrificial Steadfast Love. God is always near. God's message: Your sin can never deter my love. The chains of your foolishness have been broken by the cross. I can use sin sinlessly.

The Thorns in Marriage Thorn: Psalm 107...The Wind and Waves of the Storm Satan's message: You are going to die. All is lost. Hope is gone. God had left you. Our reaction: Cry out for deliverance. 3 or maybe 300 times. God seems absent. God's reaction: Calm the storm(sometimes). Outward and inward. God is always near. God's message: I calm the storm that I created for your good and my glory...helping you to <u>trust in</u> and <u>depend on</u> my grace alone.



Satan's Message: "harass"

to strike with the fists, beat, torment

Vision: Turn your eyes <u>away</u> from Jesus (focus on your pain) Look <u>not</u> at His wonderful face (focus on your unjust misery)




Conceit: the belief that the cancer of self-centeredness is healthy, right and good. (fine line between <u>confidence</u> and <u>arrogance</u>)




Arrogance (inward help): pride goes before destruction (Prov 16.18)




The Thorns in Marriage We say we want to be like Jesus (but please – no thorns)



<u>Submitting to one another</u> out of reverence for Christ.

Wives, <u>submit</u> to your own husbands, as to the Lord.

Husbands, <u>love</u> your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her.

You've been hurt...again.

Two Messages:

Will you still <u>submit</u> to each other? Will you continue to <u>love</u> each other?

Two Messages:

Her: "You don't know how difficult it is to submit to someone who keeps hurting me!" Him: "You don't know how difficult it is to love someone who keeps hurting me!"



1. Every marriage has thorns.

2. Every thorn in marriage hurts.

3. When hurt, whose message will we choose

to listen to – God's or Satan's?



I don't want to be "thorny" in my marriage.

How do I know when to bring a thorn up or when to quietly allow grace to cover it?

It's more about <u>how</u> and <u>why</u> you bring it up.

If you ever try to love somebody who has needs, brokenness, trouble, emotionally wounded...

it's going to cost you.



When an emotionally wounded person comes at you, you want to go the other way.



They're not going to fill up unless you empty out.



The only way for them to come into safety by your help is if you go into their danger.

She was willing to die so that those under the cover of her wings would live.

On the cross, you have God doing what you and I have to do every day if you really know how to love people.



<u>Real love always involves</u>: Substitutionary Sacrifice

Most parents willingly sacrifice for their children...

but not for their spouse.

WHY?

We see our children as completely dependent and vulnerable...

but view our spouse as someone who really ought to know better.

What if we began to view our spouse as completely dependent and vulnerable...

a bit fearful, needy, insecure, lonely



How to heal from the painful thorns in marriage:

Solution 1: a more accurate portrayal

Solution 1: a more accurate portrayal

See our <u>spouse</u> as completely and totally dependent and vulnerable...

See <u>ourselves</u> as completely and totally dependent and vulnerable...

Solution 2: a more willing forgiveness "I was wrong. Will you forgive me?" Not: "I'm sorry." (Will you absorb the cost of my sin?) "Yes, I will be happy to forgive you." Not: "Don't worry about it." (I will absorb and release your debt.)

You've been hurt...again. Will you forgive? again and again and again? (Two Messages...)

The Thorns in Marriage Satan's message: How can you keep forgiving this person? God's message: After all I've forgiven you, how can you not forgive this person?

Matthew 18.21-33

Then Peter came up and said to him, "Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?"

Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy-seven times. (or 70 times 7)

Those who are concerned as to whether the figure should be 77 or 490 have missed the point... There is no place for keeping a tally of forgiveness already used up. If one is still counting, one is not forgiving.

"Therefore the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants.

When he began to settle, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents...

God has forgiven us such a massive debt...

Should we not also forgive such a small (in comparison) thorn?


